Finding out (Facts & knowledge)	<p><u>Uses of everyday materials</u></p> <p>Identify and compare the suitability of a variety of everyday materials, including wood, metal, plastic, glass, brick, rock, paper and cardboard for particular uses</p> <p>Find out how the shapes of solid objects made from some materials can be changed by squashing, bending, twisting and stretching</p>	<p>Chn identify the materials from which common objects are made. Materials include wood, metal, plastic, glass, brick, rock, paper and cardboard. Chn learn about objects, materials, and properties. They look at objects, identify the materials they are made from, and explain why they are suitable in each situation. Objects are made of different materials. Materials have different properties. Objects made by humans are made of materials chosen for their properties. Objects can be made of more than one material. Chn to choose the right materials for different situations. Chn to explain their reasons. Human-made objects are made of materials chosen for their properties. A material can be tough, flexible, rigid, waterproof, absorbent, light, heavy, strong, transparent, opaque, insulating, smooth, rough, fragile or reflective. Chn learn about objects, materials and properties. They look for objects in the classroom, identify their main materials and draw pictures of them, grouping by material. Objects are made of different materials. Some objects are made of several different materials.</p>
Using (Applying & analysing)	<p>Asking simple questions and recognising that they can be answered in different ways</p> <p>Performing simple tests</p> <p>Observing closely, using simple equipment</p> <p>Using their observations and ideas to suggest answers to questions</p> <p>Gathering and recording data to help in answering questions</p>	<p>Simple test- Which material is best for the bottom of children's school shoes? Simple test - How well do different materials bounce? Chn carry out an investigation into the properties of small objects. They predict and test whether it is magnetic, transparent, floats, or can be squashed or stretched. Objects are made of different materials. Materials have different properties. Material properties include the ability to float, to be stretched, to be squashed, transparency, and attraction to a magnet. Material properties can be discovered through experiment. Exploring - How well can we change the shapes of some solid objects Chn carry out an investigation into how they can change the shape of up to 8 classroom objects. They predict before they test and then discuss their findings. Objects can be deformed in different ways. Some objects can be deformed by hand, while others cannot. Material properties can be discovered through experiment</p>
Concluding (Evaluating & Summarising)	<p>Make suggestions about alternative materials for a purpose that are both suitable and unsuitable</p> <p>Test the properties of materials for particular uses e.g. compare the stretchiness of fabrics to select the most appropriate for a superhero costume, test materials for waterproofness to select the most appropriate for a rain hat/umbrella, test the absorbency of different brands of baby's nappies as an investigation for a supermarket.</p>	<p>Using the results from the investigation above, ask pupils if they have enough evidence to answer the question: Is the material fit for purpose? Share ideas then pupils write a conclusion using the sentence frames: We found out that ... We know this because ... If there is insufficient evidence, explain that scientists cannot always reach a conclusion.</p> <p>How are we responsible for the materials we use? How are humans responsible for the Earth? (recycle)</p> <p>Comment critically on each other's findings using some set criteria. For example, clarity of information, accuracy of drawings / diagrams, use of appropriate scientific vocabulary, language appropriate for Year 2. Provide some time to edit and improve both the content and presentation of their work.</p>
